BACKGROUND:

On June 30, 2015 the City Council authorized the establishment of a Temporarily Restricted City Trust Fund to receive and distribute funds for the Library Renovation Project. The Friends of the Library hired Patty Farmer as Campaign Manager. Together with the Library Trustees, they have put in place the Campaign Committee with Judith Putnam and Alfreida (Dita) Englund as Co-Campaign Chairs and Ernest Hebert as the Honorary Chair.

The first step of the campaign was the private campaign that solicited donations and pledges from the Library Trustees, Friends of the Library Board and Campaign Committee members with one hundred percent participation. Since early 2016, the campaign committee has been reaching out to individuals in the community, foundations and corporations. The attached reports contain details of the monies received in October, November and December. Gifts from donors who wish to remain anonymous are directed to the Friends of the Library and are included in the Cambridge Trust Bank reports as part of the Friends of the Library donation. Donors have received acknowledgement of their donations. Since mid-October we have been conducting the public phase of the campaign.

The intent is to continue to bring forward Cambridge's monthly reports for acceptance by the City Council. The reports then will go the Trustees of the City Held Trust funds for approval and acceptance. This process was reviewed by the City Finance Department, the Library Trustees, the Friends of the Library Board, the City Attorney and Terry Knowles, Assistant Director, Charitable Trust Unit of the Department of the Attorney General.

BACKGROUND:

Concluding an investigation into the sale of both heroin and cocaine into our community, the Keene Police Department assisted the New Hampshire Attorney General's Drug Task Force with an investigation that resulted in the arrest of two individuals. This was a 2012 investigation and resulted with the seizure of both heroin, cocaine and cash. The Keene Police Department's share of this cash seizure totaled \$1,762.60.

Move that the Finance, Organization, and Personnel Committee recommend that the City Manager be authorized to do all things necessary to accept a FY 2016 Bureau of Justice Assistance Bulletproof Vest Partnership grant of \$6,032.50.

BACKGROUND:

This annual grant provides matching funds to purchase ballistic vests for our Officers. Manufacturer and Federal recommendations call for ballistic vest rotation every five years. This grant, along with city matching funds, allows the Department to meet this requirement and keep our Officers outfitted with current ballistic protection. This grant only allows for what is commonly referred to as a patrol ballistic vest. The Department must purchase a new ballistic vest for every Officer hired, and we also purchase on average between 8-12 vests annually as replacement vests.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Finance, Organization and Personnel Committee recommends the City Manager be authorized to do all things necessary to execute a contract amendment with Waste Management New Hampshire (WMNH) to provide transportation and disposal services for refuse received at the Keene Transfer Station for a period of five (5) years with options to renew for additional years.

BACKGROUND:

In December 2013, the City signed an agreement with Waste Management New Hampshire (WMNH) to provide transportation and disposal services for refuse received at the Keene Transfer Station for a period of five (5) years with options to renew for additional years

Waste Management asked to amend the contract after three (3) years because of market share loss in refuse collected outside of Keene. The original contract required Waste Management to bring eighteen thousand (18,000) tons from outside Keene to the Keene Transfer Station. Terms of an amended contract were successfully agreed upon with WMNH with a reduction in the outside tonnage Waste Management is required to bring to the Keene Transfer Station, as well as a reduction in the transportation and disposal fee to WMNH to counter a portion of the revenue reduction. The contract amendment is for a period of five (5) years with options to renew for additional years. City Staff believes the contract amendment is in the best interest of the City and the Solid Waste Fund, and gives the City several years to look at its current business model and possibly propose changes to the business model over the next several years.

WMNH has been providing transportation and disposal services for the City of Keene since 2007 and the City has enjoyed a productive public/private partnership with WMNH for the past decade.

The City Attorney's office will review the contents of the contract and any items of concern or corrections will be addressed.

SUBJECT: Reallocation of Road Rehabilitation Funds - Roxbury Street Crosswalk - Public Works

Department

RECOMMENDATION:

Move that the Finance, Organization and Personnel Committee recommend that the City Manager be authorized to all things necessary to allocate \$127,000 of unspent funds from previously appropriated Roadway Rehabilitation (90018) to the Roxbury Street Crosswalk project, \$35,000, to the Church Street Sidewalk project (90278), \$45,000 and to the Emerald Street Sidewalk project (90032-17), \$47,000.

BACKGROUND:

The Public Works Department has closed out the two construction contracts that comprised the 2017 road rehabilitation work. These two contracts included the remaining work that was authorized as part of the FY 2016 CIP as well as all of the FY 2017 work, with the exception of Water Street. Because the improvements to Water Street will include sidewalk and curbing repairs, it will be designed and bid as a separate contract.

After subtracting the budget for the Water Street improvements, approximately \$277,000 is not currently designated for a specific purpose. Several other projects planned for 2017 require additional funding. The Public Works Department recommends these remaining funds be reallocated as follows:

Roxbury Street Crosswalks

Residents requested improvements to a crosswalk at 21 Roxbury St. MSFI has selected a preferred alternative and referred the matter to FOP for funding. The estimated cost of the improvements is \$35,000.

Emerald Street Sidewalks

City Council has appropriated \$208,927 for the construction of a new sidewalk on the North side of Emerald Street. Additional funding would allow the project to incorporate streetscape features (i.e., landscape beds, bike lanes, parallel parking, seating, etc.). The Department recommends \$47,000 be allocated for this purpose.

Church Street Sidewalks

City Council has appropriated \$73,930 for the rehabilitation of sidewalks on Church Street. The Department recommends additional funds be allocated to include road rehabilitation between 93rd Street and Harrison Street. The cost of this work is estimated at \$45,000.

BACKGROUND:

In the months leading to the fall of 2014, Mayor Lane and Keene State College President Dr. Huot met to discuss the formation of a joint committee of the College and the City. The College City Special Commission was formed in November of 2014, with the charge of facilitating long range planning and developing short- and long-term recommendations to Keene State College and the City of Keene on issues of mutual concern. Following a community meeting in March of 2014 at Heberton Hall, four areas of focus were identified: Housing and Neighborhoods, Infrastructure and Parking, Citizenship, and Property / Tax Base.

Throughout 2015 and 2016, the Commission explored and discussed each of these issues in detail. Commission members consulted with subject matter experts, researched existing plans and studies focused on these topic areas, and contracted the assistance of New Hampshire Listens. The work of New Hampshire Listens included facilitated discussions with stakeholders and Keene citizens in the spring of 2015 around these topic areas and other related themes.

In the fall of 2016, the Commission released a final report, which outlined short-, medium-, and longer-term recommendations for how the College and the City can address these topic areas and provides guidance for future coordination and collaboration between the College and City. One of the recommendations of this report is to formalize the membership and operation of the Commission.

As the Commission has proven to be a successful model for coordination and collaboration since beginning work in early 2015, it is of interest to the City and to Keene State College to formalize its structure and functions. The attached ordinance establishes a College City Commission by amending the "Administration"

section in Chapter 2 of City Code to include College City Commission to the list of standing Boards and Commission and by adding Division 23, which establishes the purpose, membership, and powers, duties and guidelines of the Commission.

If the Commission were to become a formal City Committee, it would be responsible for: evaluating the progress made at implementing the proposed recommendations in the recently released report; exploring new areas of focus as directed by the Mayor and College President; and, helping to foster the relationship between the College and City communities.

AN ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Keene, as follows:

That the Ordinances of the City of Keene, as amended, are hereby further amended by including Division 23 in the listing of boards in Sec. 2-594 and inserting a new Division 23 to Article V Boards and Commissions of Chapter 2 entitled "Administration" as follows:

Division 23. College City Commission

Sec. 2-1111. Purpose.

The College City Commission is created to facilitate long range planning and develop short- and long-term recommendations to the College and the City on issues of mutual concern. It is intended to serve as a model for how a city and college collaborate effectively and engage each other in the resolution of the most pressing issues and to create a framework to address emergent opportunities.

Sec. 2-1112. Mem bership.

- (a) The College City Commission shall consist of fourteen regular voting members. No more than four alternate members may be appointed. The Mayor and the President of Keene State College shall each appoint seven voting members and two alternates. No less than two of the College's seven voting members shall be students of Keene State College.
- (b) All appointed citizens to the Commission must represent a cross section of interests in the City and College communities.
- (c) The Mayor and the President of Keene State College shall each be an ex-officio member of the Commission without a vote.
- (d) The Commission shall be governed by two chairpersons. The Mayor and the President of Keene State College shall each appoint a chairperson from the seven mem bers they appoint to represent the interests of the City and the College, respectively, and to provide leadership to the Commission.
- (e) Membership is not restricted to residents of Keene.

Sec. 2-1113. Terms.

(a) Initial terms of Commission members shall be staggered. Of the seven members appointed by the Mayor, two shall have a one-year term, two shall have a two-

year term, two shall have a three-year term, and one shall have a four-year term. Of the seven members appointed by the President of Keene State College, two shall have a one-year term, two shall have a two-year term, two shall have a three-year term, and one shall have a four-year term. After these initial terms, all members shall have three-year terms.

- (b) Regular voting members that are Keene State College students shall have oneyear terms.
- (c) In the event of a vacancy, interim appointments may be made to complete the unexpired term and shall be appointed by the original appointing authority.

Sec. 2-1114. Relation to department.

The Planning Department will provide staff support as it may be available to the College City Commission. Other City Departments may be called upon as necessary. Keene State College will provide staff support to the Commission through the President's Office.

Sec. 2-1115. Powers, Duties and Guidelines.

The functions and guidelines in this section are established for the conduct of the College City Commission. The Commission shall:

- (a) Conduct activities to promote, enhance, and encourage improved relationships between the College and City communities.
- (b) Research and evaluate topics of shared concern or interest between the City and Keene State College.
- (c) Consult with the Mayor and Keene State College President on a periodic basis.
- (d) Develop reports and recommendations to the City and Keene State College with respect to issues of shared concern or interest, and measure progress at implementing these recommendations.
- (e) Promote communication and collaboration among community groups and organizations, City staff and departments, and Keene State College staff and departments with an interest in College/City relations.
- (f) Publicize and report on its activities.
- (g) Hold meetings and hearings necessary to carry out its duties.
