SUBJECT: Light Emitting Diode Streetlight Vendor Selection - Public Works Department

RECOMMENDATION:

Move that the Finance, Organization and Personnel Committee recommends the City Manager be authorized to do all things necessary to contract with Affinity LED Lighting to supply and install up to one thousand one hundred fifty five (1,155) light emitting diode (LED) streetlights in the City of Keene for a total estimated cost of \$261,982 to be funded by the approved FY18-23 Capital Improvement Program budget.

Further, move that the Finance, Organization and Personnel Committee recommend the City Manager be authorized to do all things necessary to accept and execute available rebates for the installation of LED streetlights up to \$100,000 from Eversource.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Keene has approximately 1,152 High Pressure Sodium (HPS) streetlight and 3 Metal Halide (MH) streetlight (excluding City owned streetlight i.e. the downtown area). The streetlight are not metered, but are billed monthly per fixture by the City's electrical utility company, Eversource, based on the wattage of the fixture. Eversource has a developed a per fixture rate for light emitting diodes (LED) which would dramatically lower the cost for streetlight that are converted from HPS and MH to LED.

Currently Eversource has a rebate program that provides up to one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to communities to upgrade existing HPS streetlight to LED. The City has applied for this Eversource incentive for 2017. The Public Works Department conducted a demonstration project, in cooperation with Eversource, to gauge community reaction to the proposed conversion from HPS to LED by replacing 25 of the 30 streetlight along Marlboro Street with the following:

Existing Marlboro Streetlights:

#Fixtures	Wattage
(13)	65 Watt HPS

A survey of the public's acceptance of LED streetlight based on the demonstration project conducted by the Public Works Department revealed 80% of respondents preferred LED streetlight to the traditional HPS lights and 88% of respondents felt the LED streetlight improved visibility compared to HPS streetlight.

In March 2017 the Public Works Department issued Request for Proposal# 02-17-14 LED Streetlight Conversion and received four (4) proposals. An LED Streetlight Conversion Review Team consisting of the Assistant Public Works Director/Solid Waste Manager, Engineering Technician, and GIS Technician reviewed the four (4) proposals and selected three (3) firms to interview- Siemens, Tanko Lighting and Affinity LED. Each firm was evaluated on the following criteria:

- Understanding of the Project
- Quality of Proposal
- Cost and Projected Timeline
- Professional Qualifications
- Experience of Firm and Qualifications
- Locality of Firm
- Public Outreach Plan

Based on the interviews and evaluation of the submitted proposals Tanko Lighting was eliminated due to their proposal not meeting specifications. Affinity LED and Siemens were then compared and Affinity LED achieved the higher evaluation score (based on a 5 point scale) by all three reviewers. The total cost differential over a twenty (20) year period (supply, installation and cost of electricity) between Siemens and Affinity LED was under \$1,500, however several factors convinced the Review Team that Affinity LED would be the preferred vendor including:

- Affinity LED is a New Hampshire based company,
- Affinity LED manufacturers their lights in New Hampshire,
- Affinity LED offers a ten year warranty, and
- Affinity LED's L rating (the number of hours a fixture operates before it cannot meet a 70% efficiency rating) is more than twice that of the competitors.

The New Hampshire communities that have worked with Affinity indicated a high degree of satisfaction with the product and service from Affinity LED (Affinity LED has completed or is in the process of completing installations in Portsmouth, Dover, Somersworth, Rochester, Newmarket, Milford, Merrimack, Conway, Whitefield and Claremont). Affinity LED proposed using a local electrical contractor to perform the installation of the LED streetlight.

The overall rankings were as follows (cumulative scores of review team):

Seventy two percent (72%) of the existing fixtures in the City are 50 watt HPS lamps which can be converted to 25 watt LED lamps. Currently the City of Keene budgets \$165,000 for the electrical cost of streetlight (all streetlight except those in the downtown area which are billed to a separate cost center), per year. Factoring in the \$100,000 LED streetlight conversion incentive from Eversource to help with the projected \$261,982 cost of converting the existing 1,155 streetlight which, including installation, will have a payback in the 2 year range. The first phase of the LED Streetlight project will involve conducting an inventory of the existing streetlight to match up with the Eversource ledger. Once the exact number and wattage of the existing streetlight is confirmed and coordinated with Eversource then the conversion process for all the streetlight will begin (any work associated with this project will begin after July 1, 2017 when the FY 2017/18 budget begins). It should be noted that the City will now own the individual lighting fixtures and will be responsible going forward for the cost (materials and labor) of repair and replacement of damage or failed fixtures. This future cost will be reflected in the departments future operating budget request.

SUBJECT: Capital Purchase- Asphalt Reclaimer - Public Works Department

RECOMMENDATION:

Move that the Finance, Organization and Personnel Committee recommend that the City Manager be authorized to do all things necessary to purchase a KM T2 asphalt reclaimer from Pavement Maintenance Supply of Millbury, MA (through a State bid process), for an amount not to exceed \$80,153 and further that the City Council authorize the use of up to \$21,000 of unspent FY18 personnel funds from the Public Works Department Operating budget and that staff submit the necessary resolution to designate up to \$60,000 from the project balance of the FY15 Road Rehabilitation Project Account, 90249 for this purchase.

BACKGROUND:

The Highway Division is recommending the purchase an asphalt reclaimer to repair small pavement deficiencies throughout the City of Keene. This piece of equipment turns chunk asphalt and/or asphalt millings into a high quality recycled product. This material, generally a waste product, comes from city construction projects and is stored at 560 Main Street. An asphalt reclaimer to produce hot-mix asphalt to repair small pavement deficiencies will be particularly useful during the winter months as the facility for hot-mix asphalt closes from November through April.

Winter time can be problematic for the Highway Division to maintain streets that have potholes or delaminations and for the Water & Sewer Division for repairing trenches. The asphalt reclaimer makes a product using waste material and a rejuvenator to create a product that will be vastly superior to cold patch during the winter months, and is a product that can be used for small pavement repairs year-round. The greatest benefit of the hot-mix from an asphalt reclaimer is that it negates the need to revisit potholes, delaminations or trenches that were temporarily filled with cold patch as the hot-mix is a one-time permanent repair that will provide the traveling public with an improved experience.

The cost for cold patch, purchased hot-mix and hot-mix produced from an asphalt reclaimer:

ProductCost per TonCold Patch\$110Hot Mix from Asphalt Plant\$78Hot Mix from Asphalt Reclaimer\$10

Using a hot-mix product from an asphalt reclaimer will produce cost savings that will allow the Public Works Department to allocate funds currently used to purchase cold patch and labor to install the cold patch, to other programmatic needs and vastly improve upon the method of small pavement repair that is currently used (approximately \$14,000 per year is spent on the purchase of cold patch of which \$10,000 is estimated to be

reallocated). The Highway Division recommends the reallocation of operating budget funds in the Public Works Department General Fund to purchase a KM T2 asphalt reclaimer from Pavement Maintenance Supply of Millbury, MA (through a State bid process), for an amount not to exceed \$80,153.

For funding of the asphalt reclaimer the Department proposes to use unspent personnel funds and unspent capital road rehabilitation project funds. With the retiring of the Department's Sign Maker, there will be unspent general personnel funds and it is recommended that \$21,000 be reallocated to fund this equipment purchase. Under the Alternative to Line Item Budget Approach, the City Manager with the approval of the City Council may use personnel line funds for non-personnel activities.

Project 90249, FY15 Road Overlay Project is complete and has a project balance of \$132,889. Since this equipment is for performing road maintenance and repair work, it is recommended that \$60,000 be reallocated from this project balance for the purchase of the asphalt reclaimer. The funds are remaining bond proceeds and to be used requires the submission and approval of a resolution designating these funds for this purpose.

SUBJECT: Rt. 12/Main Street Bridge over Beaver Brook - Professional Services Contract - Public Works

RECOMMENDATION:

Move that the Finance, Organization and Personnel Committee recommend that the City Manager be authorized to do all things necessary to negotiate and execute a professional engineering services contract with the Louis Berger Group, Inc. of Manchester, NH for the construction phase of the Rt. 12/Main Street over Beaver Brook (90151-A) for an amount not to exceed \$220,200.

BACKGROUND:

In September 2014 the City awarded an engineering design contract to the Louis Berger Group, Inc. (LBG) on a qualification-based selection process. LBG has now completed the design work in a satisfactory manner. We expect to receive authorization to advertise the project from the New Hampshire Departments of Transportation (NHDOT) within the next two weeks. Construction is expected to begin by the end of July and to continue through the fall.

City Code requires that professional services contracts over \$25,000 be entered into after receiving proposals from various interested firms and approval by the City Council. Public Works recommends that the contract for construction-phase engineering services be awarded to LBG on a "sole-source" basis. As the project engineer, LBG is uniquely qualified to oversee the construction work and ensure that their design intent is carried out.

Construction-phase engineering services include full-time construction observation, attendance at construction meetings, review of shop drawings and submittals, response to contractor requests for information, materials inspection and testing, review and comment of test results, maintenance of an as-built set of drawings, and other tasks typically required during construction. This project is being performed under the NHDOT's "State Aid - Bridge" program and the engineer is also responsible for keeping the City in compliance with the State's requirements.

It is recommended that the City Manager be authorized to negotiate and execute a contract with LBG for construction-phase engineering services not to exceed \$220,200.

Funding for this work was previously appropriated as part of the FY 2016 Capital Improvement Program (90151-B).

RECOMMENDATION:

Move that the Finance, Organization and Personnel Committee recommend that the City Manager be authorized to do all things necessary to negotiate and execute a professional engineering services contract with Dubois & King, Inc. of Randolph, VT for the construction phase of the Babbidge Reservoir Dam Improvements Project (05034-B) for an amount not to exceed \$139,356.00.

BACKGROUND:

In June 2014 the City awarded an engineering design contract to Dubois & King, Inc. on a qualification and fee-based selection process. Dubois & King has now completed the design work in a satisfactory manner. The project was advertised for construction in early May. Construction is expected to begin by the end of June and to continue through the fall.

City Code requires that professional services contracts over \$25,000 be entered into after receiving proposals from various interested firms and approval by the City Council. Public Works recommends that the contract for construction-phase engineering services be awarded to Dubois & King on a "sole-source" basis. The fee proposal from Dubois & King is reasonable. They have a vested interest in the success of this project and will be an advocate to advance the project through successful construction.

Construction-phase engineering services include full-time construction observation, attendance at construction meetings, review of shop drawings and submittals, response to contractor requests for information, materials inspection and testing, review and comment of test results, maintenance of an as-built set of drawings, and other tasks typically required during construction.

It is recommended that the City Manager be authorized to negotiate and execute with Dubois & King, Inc. for construction-phase engineering services for the project for an amount not to exceed \$139,356.00.

Funding for this work will come from the Babbidge Reservoir Dam Improvements Project Account (05034-B).

SUBJECT: Underground Telecommunications Conduit Contract - IT Department

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Finance, Organization and Personnel Committee recommend that the City Manager be authorized to do all things necessary to negotiate and execute a contract for the installation of communication conduit and related materials with LJM Construction, LLC as a sole source provider. Funding for the project is to come from the reallocation of operating funds from Public Works Road and Street Maintenance budget, 02010-62331.

BACKGROUND:

A current opportunity to install underground telecommunications conduit in downtown Keene without incurring the cost of excavation and surface restoration has become possible due to the planned installation of conduit by Eversource to support their new transformer equipment. Staff learned of this project after the FY17 budget was adopted.

Staff of the IT Department and Public Works Engineering have been meeting with Eversource representatives to review planned activities and schedules. The Economic Development Action Plan supports the installation of conduit for the purpose of expanding Broadband access for businesses. Eversource's ongoing work in the downtown represents a unique opportunity to advance this goal. Doing so will require the City to acquire easements from private landowners for which the Planning, Licenses and Development Committee has authorized the City Manager to negotiate and execute said easements. The next step is to identify a funding source and contract for the materials. Eversource has contracted with LJM Construction, LLC for the excavation work and materials. It is, therefore, recommended that the City use LJM Construction as a sole source provider for the materials and services required for the City conduit. This approach will allow us to install conduits without the normal cost of trench excavation, backfill and pavement.

The cost of City materials and services based on estimates received from LJM Construction is up to \$30,000. The work planned for this summer will include conduits from Dunbar Street to Eagle Court and Cypress Street, 2-20 Main Street and the Hannah Grimes Center, and from the Commercial Street lot to Lamson and Federal Streets. Approximately 2,500 feet of conduit will be installed, along with hand-holes, pull boxes and appurtenant materials.

Public Works anticipates available funds in cost center 02010-62331 "Street Maintenance". Staff recommends moving forward with LJM Construction as a sole source provider for the project and that 02010-62311 be identified as the funding source up to \$30,000. This project has helped IT and Public Works staff to identify

current costs and specifications for this type of work and will be used in combination with the upcoming broadband study to prepare budget requests in future Capital Improvement Plans.

Ordinance O-2017-07

BACKGROUND:

The ordinance relating to salary and wage schedules for the 2017/2018 fiscal year reflects generally an across-the-board increase of 2% for non-bargaining units. The effective date of this increase would be July 1, 2017. This adjustment is comparable to that provided by the City's negotiated collective bargaining agreements. This revision also recommends additional adjustments to several non-union public safety positions, including probationary positions, considering labor market information and other conditions.

An analysis of the City work week practice indicates that an adjustment modifying the basic work week to 40 hours for certified fire department positions listed in Chapter 62-194 (Fire Chief and Deputy Fire Chief) aligns the City's standard for those positions to comparable communities and to similar positions on the City's schedule.
